



## SMSC and British Values in Physical Education (PE)

### At Woodside Primary, we aim to develop SMSC in PE by:

<b>Spiritual</b>	All pupils have a chance to participate in Sports Day, whilst KS2 pupils are encouraged to take part in school sport competitions. Children are taught about the benefits of leading a healthy and active lifestyle.
<b>Moral</b>	Children are taught to show respect for others. Children are encouraged to resolve conflicts during game situations e.g. taking turns in various positions. They are also encouraged to be gracious winners, accept defeat, and end each game with a handshake.
<b>Social</b>	During lessons, children cooperate and compete in mixed gender and mixed ability teams. The school promotes good teamwork and pupils are encouraged to support each other. Sports Captains encourage communication within their teams when arranging teams. They also lead warm-ups in PE lessons, setting a good example for all children.
<b>Cultural</b>	Through the medium of Dance, children will learn about dances around the world. They will also learn about key events in history such as the war and the great fire of London.

### At Woodside Primary, we aim to develop British Values in PE by:

<b>Democracy</b>	Pupils are taught about the need for different roles and different responsibilities, including teamwork and decision making. A pupil voice for PE & School Sport (e.g. re curriculum, extracurricular activities, kit)
<b>Rule of Law</b>	Children adhere to rules laid out for games/activities/ matches and follow them honestly.
<b>Individual Liberty</b>	There is an ethos where the views of individual pupils are listened to and respected within an acceptable framework
<b>Tolerance of those with different Faiths and Beliefs</b>	Through PE lessons, children will learn about significant events, discoveries and famous sports people who have come from other cultures. We understand that religious beliefs have had a major influence on past and present societies.
<b>Mutual Respect</b>	The school engages in competition and encourages competition within and across the community. Pupils are taught to respect PE equipment and school buildings/facilities
