4. <i>Improved health and well-being</i>	Reduction in referrals, CPOM entries, less children in crisis requiring resource base intervention.
5. <i>Improve standards in core subjects for children with lower prior attainment in Y3/4</i>	Currently only 4 and 2 children at ARE in RWM in Y3 and Y4 Aim for 6 by July 26
6. <i>Children with EAL to improve English skills</i>	4 children to attain at least 'working towards or better' in English national curriculum by July 26
